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
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Highlighting the Past, Illuminating the Present, Sparking the Future



When Giovanni Tripi graduated in May of this year, he joined his older brother, P.J. (Phillip Tripi IV) (Class of 2021) as a fourth generation Tripi to carry on the tradition of attending Charles F. Brush High School.

When Joseph and Josephine Tripi moved their family to South Euclid a few years before the school opened in 1927, little did they realize that nearly one hundred years later, their descendants would continue to graduate from Brush. Among that first generation of Tripis to graduate, in the 1930s and 1940s was Giovanni's Great Grandfather, Phillip Tripi (1939) along with his siblings Frances Masi, Rosalie Vantusko, Samuel Tripi, Vincent Tripi, Sister Mary Josepha (Jean Tripi) SND, and Martha Tripi.

Giovanni's Great Grandfather moved his family to neighboring Lyndhurst, in the early 1950s, after serving in the Army during World War II. All six of his children graduated from Brush in the 1970s and 1980, including Gio's Grandfather, Phillip Tripi Jr. (1971), and siblings, Joseph, Gregory, Kathy Fatica. Paul. and Robert.

Grandfather Phil Tripi Jr. and his wife, Patricia, began raising their family in South Euclid in 1980, then moved to Lyndhurst in 1986. All four of their children graduated from Brush during the late 1990s and early 2000,s, including Gio's father, Phil III (1998), Michael, Tricia Rawling, and Tony.

Gio's younger sister, Bella, will be a Junior and his youngest brother, Massimo, will be an incoming freshman at Brush next year. Brother P. J. is currently pursuing a degree at Kent State University. Their Great Great Aunt Martha Tripi (1947) resides in the original Tripi family home in South Euclid.

South Euclid Lyndhurst schools has seen only a few years during the last century when there were no Tripis attending one of their many schools. In May, Giovanni took his place as the nineteenth Tripi family member to graduate from Charles F. Brush High School. Will there be a fifth generation? Time will tell.

1983 Greater Cleveland Conference Champions BRUSH ARC FOOTBALL

By Rick Bloom '80 (BHS Athletic Dept) & Kim Kingzett Behm '72 On a recent September evening when the Arcs hosted Bedford, a group of Brush alumni assembled at Korb Field. It was a special anniversary celebration for the Brush team of 1983.

40 years earlier, this group of student-athletes authored an athletic story that rose from the ashes of a 1-9 season from the year prior. So overlooked was this collection of Arcs that local media had labeled them as the "GCC's RODNEY DANGERFIELD" as they prepared for the Fall of 1983. And when they began the season at O-3, it seemed as though the media predictions might have been correct!

However, this determined group of football friends, guided by new Head Coach Bill Kingzett and his staff changed the course of Brush football history. Many of the players on this '83 team had fathers who played Arc football for Coach Kingzett some 20+ years earlier. Thus, not only the team rallied but the community as well. The Arcs would run off 6 victories and notch a huge tie against perennial power Mentor to lock up a most improbable and unexpected GCC Championship. It was to be Brush's first football title in 26 years and started a 15 -game winning streak.

Led by captains Tom Schostek, Pat McHenry, and Bob Mormino, this ballclub had 3 All-GCC first-teamers and 2 second-team selections. Twenty alumni players attended this special eve on Friday 9/15 and were honored along with Coaches Kingzett and Trinetti.

When asked about their success, Tom Schostek said, we were "just a tight-knit group of guys who worked really hard and jelled as a team. No real superstars, no highly recruited players... a group of young men who had each other's backs both on and off the field, along with the valued support of their coaches."

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Local Business Spotlight ~ Fioritto Funeral Home

Class of '76 graduate, Mario Fioritto, Jr., is proud to share the story of Fioritto Funeral Home located in Lynd-hurst. During the depression, in a Cleveland neighborhood known as Blue Rock Springs (University Circle), Marianna Fioritto, a young widow and the mother of Mario Sr., owned a little general store. Watching and helping his mother, at the age of 13, Mario, Sr. learned compassion for helping families in need who couldn't pay for simple items like milk or eggs. He would carry this compassion through his 56 years in the funeral bušiness.

In World War II Mario served as a US Army medic. During this time, he finalized his plans to become a funeral director and embalmer. Upon returning home, he married the love of his life, Corinne Petrarca, and enrolled at Western Reserve University Cleveland College of Mortuary Science. He then served his apprenticeship and started Fioritto Funeral Service in 1950, with Corinne working by his side. In 1967 they relocated to the existing building on Mayfield Road.

Mario, Sr., and Corinne's devotion inspired their children to join the business. They all helped while growing up, and all three children became licensed funeral directors. Each worked side by side with their parents learning their legacy. Shortly before his death in 2006, Mario was elated to guide the family business into the third generation as his grandson obtained his license.

According to Mario, Jr. ('76) "We are proud that we are strictly a family owned and operated business. This allows us to customize and personalize our service to each family we serve. While our parents are no longer with us, we are proud that they left us, their children and grandchildren, the legacy of love, faith, family, and service we continue to share with the families we touch."

Fioritto Funeral Home serves all faiths and ethnic groups. In addition to customary services, Mario, Jr. encour-ages the pre-planning of funerals. He also encourages you "Have the Talk of a Lifetime" designed to help fam-ilies talk about what matters most in their lives and how they made a difference. These discussions can help families make important decisions about how they wish to remember and honor the lives of their loved one. Learning about memorable events and people, places and favorite activities, values, and lessons they have learned can help bring us closer to those we care about most. The talk helps us reaffirm to our loved ones how much they have impacted our life.

A Little More about Mario, Jr.

Mario Jr. owns and operates the funeral home with his sister, DonnaMarie Fioritto Tamburro, nephew William Schneider and niece Cristine Yankovic. After graduating from Brush, Mario, Jr. attended John Carroll Univer-sity, graduating in 1980, becoming a second-generation Funeral Director, licensed in 1981. Still living in Lynd-hurst he enjoys music, cooking, playing bocce, watching baseball and spending time with family. He learned during his years at Brush the importance of education, friendship and working together with others. He fond-ly remembers his participation in Choral and Drama Clubs and volunteering to sell popcorn in the front hall, continuing to this day to give it away during the Lyndhurst Home Days Parade when his family sponsors a Family Fun Day and cookout on the front lawn of the funeral home. He treasures life-long friendships he made at Brush, and enjoys keeping up with classmates on Facebook.








The Pudabalk's

Mr. Palermo, who was well respected by club members, took them under his wing.
